From the ground to top floor: Music Library History Exhibition

Opened in 1982, the Music Library is one of the branches of the University Libraries providing the primary repository of musical materials at HKU. The Music Library has been set up along with the establishment of the Department of Music. This year the Library is celebrating the 30th anniversary together with the Department of Music.

Music can be regarded as a leisure activity if one is playing the piano for a personal interest. It can also provide much stimulus when one is listening to some Anita Mui or Madonna's albums. With music as one of the academic studies at the University, music scholars pursue intellectual approaches and exercise their critical minds to fathom at great depths in the discipline. Dr. Rayson Huang, then Vice-Chancellor and a violinist, saw the significance of building up music collections in support of the curriculum and research needs of music in higher education. His vision to music at HKU has become a notable treasure in the Music Library.


The Music Library started with two rooms in the Main Building. Over the years, the growth of collection size and usage in the Music Library has been remarkable in order to meet the rapid expansion of Department of Music and the HKU community. In August 2012, the Music Library moved to the top floor of Run Run Shaw Tower. This exhibition aims to share with you the musical journey from ground floor to top floor. In this journey, you will witness the transformation of the Library's physical layouts and gain an overview of the collections and salient events illustrating the challenges and assiduous efforts that the generations of Music Librarians and support staff have experienced and asserting the Library's commitment in meeting the needs of its users.

Locations

1982 - November 1996 MB 245-249

The Department of Music and the Music Library were first located in the Main Building 245-249, the second floor of the Main Building. Once moved in, insufficient space was found immediately as 26 square meters could not house stacks of scores, journals and audio-visual materials, as well


as listening carrels, study tables, card catalogue drawers. In the late 1980s, MB 249 was made to the Music Library space, which was a music seminar room originally. addition space enabled music books located in the Main Library could be moved to the Music Library. The uniting of the music collections for the first time since the Music Library was established.




The first look



December 1996 - July 1999 1-02, 1-05 to 1-07 Hung Hing Ying Building The Music Department planned to move in the Hung Hing Ying Building in mid-1995. The Music Library would move with the Department. The Hung Hing Ying is a listed building opened in 1919. The University Librarian and the Head of the Music Department requested that the Music Library would be located on the west side of the building, which was the Senior Common Room. On 27th December 1997, the Music Library moved in. The new space was 175 square meters, nearly twice the size of the previous location in MB 245-249. As it was not planned for being a library, the inter designs and settings were different from other libraries. It consisted of five rooms which were not combined into a single space for structural reasons.





A few years later, an additional 100 square feet of space (from the former Information Bureau and washrooms) facilitated the rearrangement of the entire collection. The four separate rooms were interconnected. Users no longer had to sign out library materials to go to the Photocopier Room to make photocopies. They also no longer needed to obtain a card key to enter the locked Listening Room to use the audio-visual equipment, search the online catalogue or use the study carrels. Then, the Music Library had print materials in one room and a score room. The audio-visual collection was placed on open access for the greater convenience of users. Additional OPAC terminals and ACENet nodes were installed. The Computer Laboratory & Technician Office was managed by the Department of Music.








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Scores

Scores Collection is the primary material for the study of music. Various editions and sizes of printed scores reflect different views of performance practice. For instance, facsimile editions provide the original views of composers' works by replicating size, colour and binding. These are useful reference tools for study when users might not have access to original versions.

The largest score in the Music Library is a facsimile edition of *Iannis Xenakis* (1922-2001) *Anemoessa* (for mixed choir and orchestra, 1979)

The shelf arrangement of Western regular scores is first by the alphabetical order of the composer's last name, then by call number within the same composer. It brings

all the works of the same composer together. Anthologies, collections of pieces in similar topics, are arranged by call number only. These arrangements were a collective decision involved Music Faculty, Library Catalogers and Music Librarians.



The Department of Music regularly offers Chinese music courses. East Asian Scores, like Chinese opera and instrumental music are added on an ongoing basis.

Revolutionary model operas scores: these repertories were popular during the Cultural Revolution (1966-76)



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Different kinds of binding have been used to balance the ease of use and long-term preservation, as well as to best suit scores' individual formats.

Paperback Reinforcement
Most of the miniature study
scores' front and back covers are
reinforced by boards.
It is a more durable binding for
low use ephemeral collections.





Slipcase
The individual scores are
held together between a
custom folder and inserted
into the five-sided box with
open front or "slipcase".

Pamphlet Stitch
By sewing through the center of
folded signatures, this type of
binding allows a score to
lay flat when open.





Pamphlet Binding
To facilitate the use of a score
with parts, it has a clear-front
pamphlet binder with a
pocket at the back cover.
Thus, individual copies of
part(s) can be inserted.

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Significant events

→ 1981

Planning for a Music Library when Department of Music would commence the beginning of the academic year 1982-83.

• 1982

Opened in the Main Building.

1993

From a manual circulation system to a computerized system, the DRA Circulation Module was implemented. The connection of the Music Library's PC to the Main Library network was made.

• 1994

Acquired the first public access CD-ROM drive, together with a subscription to MUSE, a music index on CD-ROM.

• 1996

The migration to Innopac, a new integrated library system, was successfully completed. The Main, Fung Ping Shaw, Law and Music Libraries were recabled from Ethernet to Fast Ethernet yielding a much improved speed of 100mbs/sec.

• 1999

With the introduction of the credit-based system, many students from other departments have selected subjects offered by the Department of Music, resulting in a dramatic 200% increased in the number of students taking music as general education courses.

Received donation of Cantonese opera materials from the Kwan Fong Charitable Foundation Ltd including LPs, CDs, opera scripts and opera scores.

A Chopin exhibition was held to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the death of Chopin.

• 2000

Received a donation of over 6,000 items of books, scores, multimedia materials, archival materials from Professor Liu Ching-chih.

2001

The Music Library and the Department of Music jointly organized an exhibition on New Music from Around the World held in the Main Library Lobby.



• 2002

To acknowledge the donation of Doming Lam, the Library and Department of Music co-organized a Doming Lam Manuscripts Collection turnover ceremony, a mini-concert performing his representative works and a Doming Lam and His Works Exhibition.

Li Yundi & the Frederic Chopin International Piano Competition Exhibition was presented in the Main Library Lobby.



• 2004

An exhibition of 20th Century Scores was held.

• 2005

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The C.C. Liu Collection Turnover and New Book Launching Ceremony was held in collaboration with the Department of Music.

• 2011

The entire collection was tagged with RFID technology to enable self-service check-ins and check-outs. With the launch of self-check kiosks, date due slips and stamps were gone.

• 2012

Moved in Run Run Shaw Tower, Centennial Campus.





Collections & Facilities

Western and East Asian Collections

Notable strengths of the Collections feature various music areas ranging from classical music to Canto-pop music, as well as East Asian music and the world music in English and East Asian languages. Books and journals include writings in historical musicology, music theory, composition and ethnomusicology. Core reference materials were selected. With the advent technology, the Library has also offered electronic resources and databases in streaming audio/video on the web.

The Library received generous and valuable donations over years.



1996 Die Musik in Geschichte und Gegenwart (MGG), a 17-volume authoritative music encyclopedia in musicology.

1999

Western composers' complete works began to be developed in support of research needs.

In 1999, a project was conducted to replace vinyl long-play records with CDs involving approximately 250 titles.

The Music Library placed subscriptions to the web version of two important indexes and abstracts -- RILM Abstracts of Music Literature and International Index to Music Periodicals Full Text.

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The New Grove Dictionary of Music & 2nd Edition, a 29-volume Musicians, reference work, the most authoritative and comprehensive reference materials for musicologists.

Subscriptions were made to core electronic databases including The New Dictionary of Music & Musicians (via Oxford Music Online) and Music Index Online.

Another significant web resource was added. Music Index Online, an important index for music researchers, went live.
